
Queer Youth and the Child Welfare System.

A zine exploring the experiences of queer youth and foster parents involved in the child welfare system.



Queer youth are **overrepresented** and **underserved** in the child welfare system.



This means that despite
the high prevalence of
LGBTQIA+ youth and
children in the child
welfare system, their
unique experiences, needs,
and perspectives are often
overlooked or undervalued.

Queer youth are often marginalized throughout the child welfare system "from referral into the system to aging out or leaving care."

Studies show that queer youth have higher rates of mental health issues, emotional distress, and experiences of discrimination than cisgender and/or heterosexual youth in the child welfare system.





Queer **foster parents** face similar discrimination.

Despite the increasing amount of queer folks who enter the child welfare system with the intention to be foster parents, LGBTQIA+ adults often face discrimination and prejudice from service providers.



Queer foster parents report experiencing increased **scrutiny** and **pressure** to hide their queer identity.



Queer foster parents are often automatically considered "second best" to heterosexual or cisgender foster parents, despite the fact that research shows that trans foster parents tend to be more open or accepting of queer youth, BIPOC youth, and youth with documented mental or behavioral issues.

Researchers suggest that child welfare social workers and service providers should undergo explicit training on how to serve LGBTQIA+ youth.


